	Since the passage of the Every Student Succeeds Act in 2015, the majority of states have incorporated college and career readiness indicators into their school accountability systems. However, most readiness measures states use are proxy measures meant to <i>predict</i> successful postsecondary outcomes (such as earning dual credit), as opposed to actual postsecondary data that provides <i>evidence</i> of success (such as enrollment in college-level, credit-bearing coursework). All4Ed's new report, <i>Undermeasuring</i> , compared statewide readiness rates with college enrollment and remediation rates for recent high school graduates and found many states' college and career readiness indicators may be underestimating, or undermeasuring, students' postsecondary potential. Learn more about how to improve states' readiness indicators so they can better reflect the knowledge and skills students need to succeed beyond high school.
